

Know that I am here to serve in any way I can, and if you have any comments or concerns, feel free to contact me at any time!



This is a heck of a topic to be writing as I just noted in the Morning Huddle of the ADA that the U.S. News & World Report has released a survey rating dentistry as the number one job in America. Meeting opened with an invocation by President Jamie Mitchell.

- Nancy O'Brien, chair of the nominating committee, reported and placed in nomination to her committee two names for consideration to fill the at-large positions, Jimmy Cassidy III, and Michael Wright. Approved unanimously by the EC.
- The circumstances regarding the planned speaker for Thursday's meeting was discussed and it was unanimously agreed upon that future speakers would be presented to the EC prior to committing them and booking for a CDDS meeting.
- Next a discussion ensued regarding the recent CGTC survey that was sent to some members regarding the dental assisting program. Paul Fraysure reported that the purpose of the survey was to generate feedback as to the viability of the program as is, converting it to a CODA accredited program or cancel the program. The school will accept the completed surveys and evaluate the results. All EC members present agreed that any CODA involvement may have the potential to be harmful in the future. Paul, Nancy and Don are on the advisory board at the CGTC and will apprise us of further actions by the schools.
- Jay Harrington gave a report about the ADA October Annual Session that took place in Denver. Highlights included a \$10.00 dues increase and adoption of new sedation guidelines that will trickle down to the individual states.
- Mike Loden reported on the status of the IDBG, our buying group venture. The leadership is confident that it will be taking orders in December. The Executive leadership is negotiating for service and equipment contracts as well.

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Highlights from the Board of Trustees

- Dr. Ben Jernigan, Jr. called the meeting to order.
- GDA Officer Nominations at the meeting were as follows: Dr. Evis Babo – GDA Vice President; and Dr. Kumar Patel – GDA Editor.
- ADA Delegation Seats Central District Nominee: Dr. Amber Lawson – filling the expiring term of Dr. Kara Moore.
- Dr. Marshall Mann, Chair GDA Governance Task Force covered the GDA Proposed Structure which was passed at the House of Delegates.
- Dental Lifeline Network coordinator that was hired resigned. The Network is currently being run out of Colorado until we find a replacement.
- The GDA Annual Convention will be held July 20-23, 2017 at the Omni Amelia Island.
- The IDBG ("Integrity Dental Buyers Group") went live on December 16, 2016 and there was a webinar on December 12, 2016;Memberships fees cut in half; 600+ Dentist signed up (450+ and Emergency situation – Immediate response.
- Jones and Kolb Audit Report: lots of adjustments have been made but no critical deficiencies noted due to the way administration handled transition. Bottom line our finances (Books) look good moving forward.
- ADA Communications: \$18M campaign approved to drive people to their dentist.
- ADA in Atlanta 2017: volunteers needed.
- GMOM 2018: need a district/area to step up (No GMOM in 2017).
- GDIS Report: Top 5 Small Business Agency by Hartford for September and October 2016; Introducing personal lines for 2017 (through SafeCo).
- ADA Delegation: Jay Harrington is our new 5th District Trustee Elect (taking over for Red Stevens).
- Governmental Affairs Committee: we are working on a compromise bill with the hygienists and the chair women of Health and Human Services for the House and Senate. The bill will likely include some form of general supervision for hygienists.

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• Amber Lawson reminded those present that the Legislative Reception will be held Tuesday, November 29th,7pm at the Brickyard Golf Club. Maximum member and spouse attendance is encouraged.
